

It's been a wonderful year

This year's 2x2 relays had a way of reminding us, month after month, why we keep coming back. Not just for the paddling, but for the creativity and the quiet sense of belonging. We began the year with **New Year's Resolutions**. The team names felt thoughtful — balance, consistency, awareness, forward motion — and in hindsight they traced a neat outline of the year ahead.

March brought **The Ides of March**, and with it a dose of theatrical flair. Shakespearean names, dramatic moments on the water, personal bests, unexpected swims: *"Among these noble crews, John T. did strive with heart so fierce, his eyes set on the prize, his zeal such that, he fell into the drink 'fore all their eyes.*

April's relay was devoted to all types of lagomorphs. For several paddlers it was a first encounter with the 2x2 format, and it did not take long to discover that paddling 2 km "four times" is a very different proposition from paddling it once. One of the standout performances of the morning came from Cass O'Connor, paddling eight and a half months pregnant. There was a real tussle between the "Rascally Rabbits" with the "Cal and Myx Bunnies". Kev suggested it would have been a moot point if his partner, Andy, didn't persistently line up for his leg 20m behind the start line. Bunny ears appeared in many variations, including homemade efforts and one very large Lindt bunny mounted to a boat — later claimed enthusiastically by Grace.



The arrival of spring coincided with **Aussie Icons** and a new course that demanded both effort and interpretation. True to the Aussie spirit, the event had all the flavours of a “laid-back” culture that could only be described as iconic. *Some were paddling upstream, some downstream, and others seemed to be following the Sydney Harbour Ferry lines. Paddlers were confused as a roo in headlights and the German timekeeper reconsidering her life choices.* Don, paddling as part of the Budgy Smugglers, took the team spirit to a whole new level by rocking up in a pair of actual Budgy Smugglers. While most people would have opted for more subtlety, Don clearly thought: “*Why not give the crowd what they want?*” There was laughter, encouragement, and plenty of banter, reminding us that the relay format thrives as much on connection as it does on competition.



October's **Australian Rivers** relay was a standout for its atmosphere alone. The Lane Cove River was calm and generous, with birdlife along the banks and shimmering jellyfish beneath the surface. The group received an introduction to standing and running changeovers which we'll all have been practicing in the coming events. Appropriate to the theme there were lavender scented bath bombs and shower gels after the race. But the real highlight (and surprise) was a baby goat on a dog lead.



The 2x2 series continued with **Music to Paddle To**, which began under heavy rain and ended in sunshine. Despite the weather, every team turned up. The racing was tight, the handicaps challenging, and the theme was embraced with enthusiasm — from decorated boats to carefully chosen soundtracks, such as the *Sound of Silence*.
